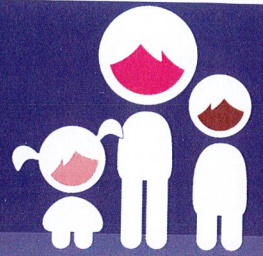


No school No service



- The Department of Education is committed to engaging with all students, families and community stakeholders to ensure all children are attending school every day.
- Student engagement in school is everyone's business and requires support from everyone in the community. We want to work with you to help ensure children and young people do not miss the valuable opportunities schooling provides. This includes learning, developing life skills, being active and building friendships.
- The Northern Territory Government is partnering with local businesses to re-fresh the 'No School No Service' campaign, limiting service in retail stores and businesses during school hours.
- This campaign has been running successfully across the Territory for some time, we have developed new collateral to re-fresh the campaign and make a strong connection between 'No School No Service' and attendance and engagement in school. This will support the attendance media campaign that we are currently promoting.
- Business will be able to serve students accompanied by a parent or guardian, however we are asking for businesses support to decline service to school aged children (6-17years), who present alone during school hours (8:30am – 3pm) Monday to Friday during term time.
- Business owners and managers will need to talk to staff members to ensure they are aware of the initiative and their business has chosen to communicate this message to school-aged children.
- Businesses are requested to display updated 'No School No Service' and 'Why Attendance Matters' posters prominently in their shop windows and/or in their store. Promotional stickers are also available on request.

Always call triple zero (000) in an emergency or life-threatening situation.





DOES ATTENDANCE REALLY MATTER?

1 or 2 days a week doesn't seem like much, but...

If your child misses:	That equals:	Which is:	Over 13 years that's:
 1/2 day per week	 20 days per year	 1 month per year	 1.5 years of school
 1 day per week	 40 days per year	 2 months per year	 2.5 years of school
 2 days per week	 80 days per year	 4 months per year	 5 years of school
 3 days per week	 120 days per year	 Over half a school year	 8 years of school
